

Wednesday, October 17, 7:00 PM - Register On the Frontiers of Medical Ethics with Dr. Arthur Caplan



Genetic ancestry testing, genetically engineered babies, and face transplants—where are we going and should we go there? These are just some of the sensitive topics that will be discussed in this talk by Dr. Arthur Caplan.

Professor Caplan is currently the founding head of the Division of Bioethics at New York University Langone Medical Center in New York City. He is the head of the ethics program in the Global Institute for Public Health at NYU. On New Year's Day 1818, Frankenstein was published anonymously in London by 20-year-old Mary Shelley, wife of the Romantic poet Percy Bysshe Shelley and daughter of the philosopher and feminist Mary Wollstonecraft. It would become one of the most influential novels of the 19th or any other century, even as it remains a

work most people know through cinema or popular culture rather than from having read the book.

In honor of its 200th anniversary, Dr. Mark Schenker of Yale College will discuss the novel as a reflection of its cultural milieu, as an expertly crafted construction of first-person narrators, and as an examination of grand themes of Science and Art, and of Creation and Birth. Patrons are strongly encouraged to read the book before attending the lecture. Copies of the book are available at the Circulation Desk or inquire about inter-library loan.
