The Big Read: "The Grapes of Wrath" by John Steinbeck

September - October 2010



The Ridgefield Playhouse in partnership with the Ridgefield Library has received a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts to host *The Big Read* in Ridgefield, an initiative of the Endowment designed to restore reading to the center of American culture.

To get involved just check out a copy of *The Grapes of Wrath* at the Library or purchase a discounted copy at *Books on the Common* and begin reading now. You can also participate in the many related events coming this fall including book discussions, movies, concerts, art exhibits, lectures, and more.

The Big Read is a program of the National Endowment for the Arts in partnership with the Institute of Museum and Library Services and Arts Midwest.

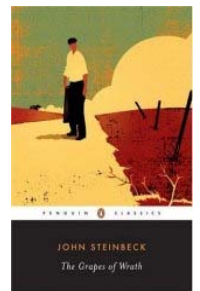

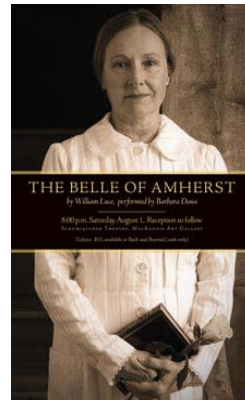

Emily Dickinson Comes to Town!

Join us for three special programs this September featuring award-winning actress, author and playwright Barbara Dana. **Power Girls** is the title of the first program to take place at the Ridgefield Library on **Saturday, Sept. 11 at 10 AM**. Barbara Dana will portray and discuss two exceptionally strong women from history, Emily Dickinson and Joan of Arc. Dana's program includes an exploration of the similarities and differences between these two "power girls," along with slides and readings from the author's HarperCollins novels, *Young Joan* and *A Voice of Her Own: Becoming Emily Dickinson*. This program is aimed at middle and high school girls and may be especially interesting to women's groups, although anyone is welcome to attend.

The second program will take place at the Library on **Thursday, September 16 at 7 PM** and is called **Meet Emily Dickinson**. Barbara Dana will perform short excerpts from the play *The Belle of Amherst* and talk about her own craft as an actor and author. **Register requested.**



The grande finale event will be the not-to-be-missed **Friends of the Library** benefit performance of William Luce's ***The Belle of Amherst***, a one-woman play, based on Emily Dickinson's own words in poetry and letters. The play was first staged on Broadway in 1976 and earned Julie Harris a Tony Award for Best Actress.

Barbara Dana has performed widely on stage, TV and Film. She has performed *The Belle of Amherst* at Emily Dickinson's home in Amherst, MA and most recently at the Bronx Botanical Gardens as part of the *Emily Dickinson's Garden* exhibit.

This performance takes place at **The Ridgefield Playhouse** on **Sunday, September 26 at 3 p.m.** Tickets are \$25/\$35/\$45/\$10 for students and can be purchased at www.ridgefieldplayhouse.org or by calling 203-438-5795. **Proceeds benefit the Friends of the Library.**

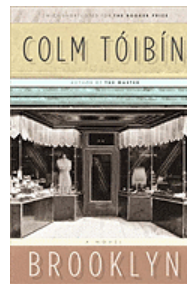

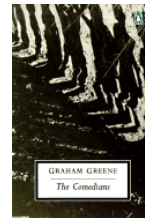
