Stuart M. Kaminsky	Toby Peters, 1940s Hollywood private investigator
Mary Kruger	Brooke Cassidy, 1890s Newport, Rhode Island debutante, and detective Matt Devlin, who becomes her husband
Margaret Lawrence	Hannah Trevor, midwife and Revolutionary War widow (FICTION)
Stephen Lewis	Catherine Williams, Colonial times midwife
Ann McMillan	Narcissa Powers, young widow, and Judah Daniel, a freedwoman and herbalist in Civil War Virginia
Mardi Oakley Medawar	Tay-bodal, Kiowa healer in 1860s Oklahoma
Annette Meyers	Olivia Brown, 1920s Greenwich Village poet and private investigator
Maan Meyers	The Tonnemans, New Amsterdam family
Brent Monahan	John Le Brun, 1890's southern gentleman and Georgia sheriff (FICTION)
Miriam Grace Monfredo	Glynis Tryon, librarian and suffragette in 1860s Seneca Falls, New York
Owen Parry	Captain Abel Jones, Welsh immigrant reluctantly drawn into the Civil War (FICTION)
Eliot Pattison	Duncan McCallum, an exiled Scottish chieftain in Colonial America
Elliott Roosevelt	Eleanor Roosevelt, 1930 & '40s First Lady
Troy Soos	Mickey Rawlings, much-traded 1910s baseball second baseman
Victoria Thompson	Sarah Brandt, turn-of-the-century midwife in the tenements of New York City
Deborah Woodworth	Rose Callahan, Shaker sister in 1930s North Homage, Kentucky
